


lisenheimer was Custard's second album with Ra, their third album overall and their 12th release. The Wisenheimer booklet continued the theme in Wahooti with each band member getting a page portrait.

# The name

The word "wisenheimer" came from EDF's Apple Powerbook dictionary. It was purely

coincidental that it started with a "w".

(Though the naming of the future albums 'We Have the Technology' and 'Wacked not Wacky' may not have been so coincidental.) During mixing the band were all sitting around spitting out potential titles that no one would unanimously agree to. Some candidates were "Working Man Blues" with a picture of all 4 cus-dads on the cover. Another was "The Stalker" with a picture of an owl on the cover. Very soon things



bogged down. David -See, the thing you

have got to remember is that Danny and Matthew were HEAVILY into smoking pot back then. They could smoke more pot than anyone I have every seen before or since. They didn't just have a few puffs, get

wacked and enjoy it. To them it was

a competition to see who

could smoke the most and still maintain control of their bowels. Danny and Matt had a brothership of addiction. So much so, that when they said that they were going home half way through, Paul and I were not too worried. In some instances, it is easier to get things moving when there are less opinions. So, Paul and I sat down and started coming up with ideas for the album

i.e. name, coverart, lyrics or no



band pictures? This was soon after my now famous run in with the DSS where I denied I was in a band and they swiftly produced a fresh copy of Wahooti Fandango with my picture and name on it. So, I thought it would be better to have no names on it at all. Paul insisted on having at least the surnames on it, so that is what we did. It gave us a chance to deny we were in the band if we ever needed to. We could say, 'Oh Mr Medew? No, that's not me. Must be some other Medew..."

Mixing was almost over and they still had no name. They were getting desperate. David was about to go to Las Vegas and Memphis for a month with Maureen, Paul and David finally started going through every word in EDF's powerbook dictionary. Suddenly the word

MASH. David -"I said that in a lot of interviews because I quickly became bored with the real story. I thought, well, everyone watches MASH, maybe this is a common refer-

ence point." One place I have seen the word used is in a J.D. Salinger book.

# The cover

The "squashed D" Custard type came from David. "I was listening to a lot of rap and hip hop around that time. Those artists always seem to have a stack of logos and stuff all over their records. I liked that vibe. I wanted to establish a type face we could use from here on in. I liked the squashed D because it looks like someone ran out of space or moved it whilst it was being photocopied." The magnet was a necessary

adjunct. David wracked his brain trying to emulate the simplicity of the Superman logo. Eventually he chose the horse shoe magnet because it

looked like a "C". He faxed a rough mockup to Simon "Slim" Alderson and he drew a nice ver-

The Wisenheimer GT was designed by Simon, again based on something Paul and David had agreed to. David wanted a car radiator grill but the two settled on a cute little car instead. Simon based the image on an Indian poster. Simon — "The Photographer had some photos taken in India. They use a lot of badly drawn hand painted advertising images on billboards. They have a certain naive quality because the perspective is always wrong. It saved me having to do a bad drawing because we already had one."

# The pictures

All the band pictures were taken by photographer Jay Blakesberg in San Fransisco the morning before Danny and Matt were to fly back to Brisbane. Danny's picture was taken in Jay's studio. None of Danny's photos taken outside turned out good enough so they tried

> again in the studio. The photo that appears on the inside of the Apartment single, (see left) was taken at the very same studio as they all sat

on the floor. David's picture was taken in front of a parked car. He



was carrying a harmonica at the time. "I always keep a harmonica with me. I was playing it, amusing myself, staring into the reflected sun glair of the camera and BANG! Photo taken..." -David.

# The lurics

"Eric Drew Feldman always

# DAVID MCCORMACK

In the last Cuszine interview with you I asked you what was the future of Custaro. This question has more pertinence than ever now that your contract with BMG is up and you are considering solo projects etc. What plans have you got fr the next year or so?

Personally, I am pretty happy with BMG at the moment. They are quite supportive of us. Lets face

it, we wouldn't get the chance to fuck up as much as we do on just any label. It takes a special kind of unconditional positive regard for them to let us get away with it. And most of the time we slag 'em off as well. We are brats!

Would you agree that to some extent BMG "dropped the ball" in their management of Custaro in the last few months? Have all the problems with the CD, and the CDROM pissed you off?

There were some problems with the CD, but for all of us it is just a learning experience. This was the

first time BMG had attempted a Mac/PC CDROM as extensive as what we wanted, on the same disc as the music. They are smarter than me, that is for sure.

Loverama \*is\* a very bleak record. It is almost completely compiled of negative imagery compared with say Wisenheimer which has a lot of "positive" sounding songs like apartment, dreamer, nicotine etc. Have you decided the world is a shitty place?

FHM said in its review that our new album is good, but not as good as our classic album, Wisenheimer. I can not tell what bits we do are good and what bits we do are bad. It is impossible for me to listen to any of our old albums. They are made up of too many personal references and band in jokes that have gone by the way side. It is like looking at a


family album... it is hard to look at pictures of all the people you used to have fun with and now they do not exist anymore.

If it were up to you what would you choose as the fourth single (if at all)?

I really like The New Matthew.

What is your plan for the David Liam
McCormack solo album?

I have no plans for a David McCormack solo album at the moment. I am looking forward to the Matthew Robert Strong album. That will be something different and interesting.

Why are "producers" still neces-

sary these days?

In Custard, there are just no good decision makers. We can not decide how many songs, what is good, what is crap, what sounds right. Producers also bear a lot of the responsibility too. They have to keep everything moving along and progressing. We can act like naughty school kids!

#### Is it true that "The Drum" was almost left off WHTT? Was that EDF?

On WHTT we all wanted a Custard album with a song by everyone. WHTT is, in retrospect, too long and confused. But we were confused at the time so, what are ya gonna do? Loverama has a few too many songs on it. Maybe Almost Like A Song could have been left off, and maybe KinderWhore and maybe Hit Song. Who knows, it is too late now anyway.

# What do you think of the latest Pavement record?

I found it boring at first, now I am starting to like it more. I sometimes get sick of Steve Malkamus and Beck rambling on with their free associative lyrics about old men with no clothes and candleabras. You know what I mean?

When recording, are you ever frustrated by hearing what you want in your mind, but not being able to scoop that out as it were and lay it down on tape? If so, what do you do in this situation?

Sometimes, I prefer the demo version of a song to the fin-

ished one. Often, a certain extra magic gets captured on a demo that gets lost once everyone knows what they are playing. I like the demos of Funny and The New Matthew for that reason. There is nothing you can do about it. You just gotta go with it.

# Of all the songs you have written, which is the one you are most proud of?

Ummm, whatever my latest song is.

"I made up a list, a list in my mind, of everyone helpful of everyone kind". Does this refer to a CD's thankyou notes?

This refers to all the people that have helped us or supported us or just been plain decent with us through out the years and the other bit ... "I refer to a list a list in my mind of everyone naughty fucked up and unkind" refers to those people who have hindered us over the years. There have been equal numbers of both.

# Why did you decide to cut the Uncle Davey part of Radio Ringo?

It started to annoy me.

# What is your most embarrassing moment?

Reading the crap I had said in previous episodes of Cuszine.

Do you have any interesting scars?

No.

#### Were you really a court room sound recordist?

No. I said that in an interview with Brisbane News. Peter Fenton (ex-Crow) had said in an interview that he was a court room sound recordist, so I thought that sounded pretty cool. It was hard to lie to the woman journalist from the Brisbane News, but I did it, she believed me, and here we are.

# What was school like for you? Do you miss it?

School sucks, but was the best time of our lives for all of us. Depressing isn't it?

Glenn is a songwriting genius. He can fix anything and make sense out of any confusing situation and is a great guy to hang out with. Those are very attractive attributes for someone in Custard.

I seem to recall just talking for an hour or so about cars and rental homes and University.

Sometimes I hate the audience when we play. Sometimes they are nice and I like 'em.

Somewhere, sometime you said that the release of your very first CD was the biggest thrill and that subsequent CDs haven't really been as exciting. How excited were you about Loverama?

I was very excited about the release of Loverama because I think it is good.

# Do you concentrate more on lyric writing these days?

On Loverama, I made sure that you could dance to every song and that I wouldn't be ashamed of the lyrics. I attempted to make sure that all the lyrics









made sense in some way, even if it was just to me.

# Why do you like wrist watches so much?

I like to know what time it is so I can tell Paul Medew, although he has a watch now too.

# What new songs are you writing at the moment?

I have written some songs lately. One is called "Millionaire Adventurer Balloonist" which I intend to play with The Olympics (Serge ex-Pollyanna and Andrew Lancaster). Also, I have been playing some new songs with Glenn, "Sleepyhead" (about Trevor Ludlow and Paul Medew and Emma's cat "Mullet" [no relation!]) and "Photo Opportunities". I hope to play them to you one day soon.

Has Custard ever come close to splitting up?

Nope.

#### Who is the "Father of Sounds"?

It sounded good to me. I like the idea of someone being the parent of all the good sounds in the universe.

What does the line "conversation fish" mean?

RB was hanging around when we came up with Monkey and we were all having a good time, laughing and making up words. He came up with conversation fish. I like the sound of it.

Do you plan on having children?

No.

What do you think of money?

I think money is rude.

How was Monkey conceived?

Matthew had a made up nursery rhyme song that went "I am a little monkey I live in a tree" that he would sing whenever the mood took him. Often a new song would have those words thrust upon it before any "real" words came about. So, Monkey started like that and we all just finished it together. Roughly, I guess you could think it was about a stalker. The "You can call me stalker" bit reminds me of Helen Razor when she was being stalked at JJJ. Quite a scary proposition.

#### What is Ringo about? What are "W" bins?


It is true that Custard had a rough version of RINGO hanging around about the time we did WHTT. But to be honest with you, it was total shit. About all it was was a bit of the verse and a bit of the other bit. The only words it had was I Feel Like Ringo and I Made Up A List... I came up with the riff to the verse one day whilst watching TV and it excited me so much that I just had to ring up Paul Medew and tell him. He said, "Yeh, it sounds alright" and didn't seem too impressed. Then, I was over at Paul

Hester's house with Joe Malone and John
Lowery and Bob Moore and we were just
messing around playing each other some
new songs and I played them the tiny scrap of
a song I had.

Anyway, shoot forward to April 1998, about one year later, and I was in melbourne to do hessie's shed. I wanted to do some new songs so I quickly completed RINGO. I made up some words and put in the end bit. The W bin is the bass speaker part of a PA system, so called because they look like "w"s. It used to be common practice for support bands to load in the headline acts PA and equipment. Not anymore.

RINGO contains a lot of music industry references! Forget about rock stars, forget about microphones, forget about w bins!

Paul. You are arguably the best bassplayer in Australian Rock and I guess you are an OK guy as well. What is your secret?

David lets get this straight...I'm not often a very good bass player and sometimes a complete cunt as well.

You follow in a long line of shy and quiet bass players like John Paul Jones, John Entwistle, Bill Wyman, Brian Wilson (and Paul McCartney wasn't exactly wild). What is it with bass players? Is this all a front?

Theory #1...somebody has to keep the music together while the guitar players are showing off

Theory #2... bassplayers actually do get up to all sorts of wild and outrageous stuff while on stage but everybody is too busy watching the guitar players showing off to notice.

Theory #3... I always considered myself to be a guitar player but events conspired to make me become a bassplayer... ie. We are

what we is.

(Interesting astrological aside... Saturn resides in my house of work and career...it can be argued that the bass is a very Saturnine instrument...Saturn representing solidity and sobriety.)

"Girls Like That..." started life in a very different form. How did the song evolve? Who decided it should take a disco direction?

Indeed, Girls was more

more disco-like with

and a star was

How was
"Hit
song"
composed?

From memory we were sitting around in the old Spring Hill practice room trying to come up with new songs. We were playing this game where we were swapping instruments and taking turns playing the first thing that came into our heads. The Hit Song riff came from me. David turned it into a song later on. A few people have pointed out how it's similar to The Beatles You Can't Do That which I didn't realise at the time. But that is one of my favourite early Beatles songs so I guess I subconsciously stole it.

# What are the origins of the name "Medew"?

It's Norwegian or something... very obscure. When I was little and playing air guitar to Kiss Alive II while my folks were doing the weekend shopping I always swore I'd change my name if I became a pop star. But then I discovered Mick Medew from the Screaming Tribesmen (kinda well known eighties Australian indie band for the younger kids out there) I thought it was okay.

A few custaros have commented that Edf went a bit peculiar during the recording of the WHTT cd. They said he would have tantrums and was generally dictatorial and difficult.

# What happened?

Eric is a lovely but serious man. I think he just took the project a little too personally... he cared too much.

## Why are PCs better than Macs?

Why is yellow better than blue?

Touring can be hard to survive, and over the years different musicians have required different travel accessories to help them get through - eg, Ozzy Osbourne's black jelly beans loveliest, most caring and conand Slash's heroin kit bag. What do you consider essential accessories for the road? What do you think of touring?

A good book is essential. A hotel with a washing machine. Strong painkillers and a stash of vitamins. The ability to sleep in cars/planes. A love of waiting around doing nothing for long stretches at a time. Being with people you like. Some bands don't like each other...that

would be a nightmare. I like touring...It wears me

out...It's a young mans game. But just to be really cliched' I love playing. And I get to see different places sometimes which is always a good thing.

# "Paul's got a Girlfriend": can you tell us a little about the mystery lady behind the killer song?

That song is more a documentary than a song. It's all true. She's from Melbourne. She digs computers like I do. She's a huge Radiohead fan. She studies multimedia. She's talented, cute, funny, a great cook, and I absolutely adore her.

Dylan McCormack reckons you are the best guitarist in Custard. What do you think of this statement?

It's wrong.

# What is Matthew really

Despite the wildman image Matt is one of the funniest, siderate people I know. He's actually very domesticated. He reads a lot on tour. And he's a very good guitar player.

> In the studio do you keep to yourself or are you a hands on, "ideas" man?

If I've got something to say I'll say it.

In Cuszine 2 Magoo said he couldn't say if you got takes first time but he did say you take less takes than

Matthew. Is he just being diplomatic? You never fuck up takes do vou?

Either I'll do it really quickly or it will be agonising and tortuous. I'm different than David and Glenn who can just play stuff that is instantly great straight off. I need to feel I know the song and to have time to play around with it for a bit. If I'm comfortable with the song I can do it okay otherwise it can take me some time to know what I'm playing. I

always hate what I've done after we finish a record because by then I'm familiar with the songs and can see what I would've done differently. The live versions often end evolving a little.

# Paul. Every single Custard fan out there, and I've spoken to every single one of them worries about you smoking. What is your plan?

Thank you for your concern. I'm actually not smoking at the moment. It's been a week today. I won't say I've given up...just curtailed the nicotine intake a little. I'll be fine kids.

# David smokes a lot now. Should we be worried about him too? Does this make giving up even harder?

I don't think David realises how addictive and how insidious cigarettes are. But he is a very strong willed gentleman and I hope he has no trouble stopping if he gets into trouble with it.

Are you a vegetarian?

I eat fish ...so no.

# What sort of father are you? Do you nag? Are you doting and protective?

I love being a dad. I'm verv patient and encouraging. Madison and I are good friends I think.

What will you be like when Madison is old enough for boys?

Old and grey.

# What do you think of fame?

It is actually one of my favourite Bowie songs.

What are you going to do after Custard stop making music and touring?

I want to be a postman. With a little motorbike.

# If you could be in any other band, past or present who would it be?

I wish I was Ace Frehely. (KISS)

# What is your favourite Custard bassline and your favourite Custard song?

Favourite Custard bassline is Nervous Breakdance...Favourite Custard song is Correctional facility...

# Are you going to sing on any upcoming b-sides?

There is in fact a song of mine called The Modern Age on the B-Side to the New Matthew single. I like the song but hate the version.

# Any plans for a sort of Lou Reed style solo album? (Put me down fr two copies)

Yeah I must get round to doing that solo album sometime...

# The great Tarago crash of '93. What happened?

Matt got drunk and wrote off a brand new Tarago while on tour in Sydney. Nobody else in the band was there. Nobody was hurt. He ran away from the scene of the crime but got off

scott free...except the hire company Showtravel (who also book our flights) made him eat Kosher meals on the airplanes for the next two years.

The White album was considered too long and a dud by contemporaries but later many

critics re-evaluated that stand and many think it is better than Sgt Peppers. Now David has bagged

WHTT because it was too long and lacked direction. What do you think of this album and do you think that maybe in a few years time David may appreciate it more?

We were actually listening to bits of that album in the tarago the other week. I never listen to Custard records but it sounded pretty good to me.

David said he rang you up after he had written the lead riff in Ringo to see what you thought and you said "yeah it sounds alright". Do vou remember this?

Yes I do remember that call. I think my reaction was a little more positive than that howev-

# What do you think is David's best riff/ piece of music?

Correctional Facility is lyrically and musically a fucking master-

When David is showing you a new song does he ever say, "no that sucks do it this way" or is he very laissez faire about your bass play-

> He gives me suggestions sometimes. He's a lot smarter than me.

Anything with Al Pacino or Robert DeNiro.

#### Favourite TV show?

I love a good doco. I love SBS news. The Simpsons and Seinfeld are awesome. And it took me awhile to get it but Friends is actually a very funny show.





# Tell us about the picture in the centrefold of Matthew nude. You took that photo?

Yes. I was the producer and I was trying to get Matt onto the Olivia Newton-John school of nude singing, Getting them to push the boundaries. Think about things a little differently... laterally. Not that Matt is unaccustomed to nude work. I am quite sure but he most probably came up with the idea. And he's got a pretty good body and it should be shown off.

## It was at Sunshine Studios?

Yep.

# You were talking earlier about defining Matthew's role.

I listened to Gastanked and I really liked the songs and I'm not saying I know everything but what I thought was that there was no role defined in the guitar parts. It seemed to be David and Matthew playing over the top of each other. And then when you hit the studio it's so easy for the person who could do the part best to do most of the recording. We had to define the roles. So David would play the clean parts and Matthew would play the dirty parts. So therefore you had David's personality on there and you had Matthew's personality coming through.

# Gavin was drumming back then. What did you think of him?

Gavin was good. He was as competent as anybody else. As far as drummers go he did what he was supposed to do.

# What about Danny?

Danny was a good drummer too. Excellent drummer. Danny had a pretty good pop feel. He had a very definite idea of how he wanted to sound. Sometimes that held up proceedings, but because of his pedanticness there's a certain vibe and energy in those recordings that you would never get out of Gavin. Each player stamps their own personality.

Glenn has definite ideas about how loose he wanted to sound. In that way it can be quite restrictive. As a producer the fantasy is to get a bunch of good songs and get Danny in to do the hard 'n fast ones and get Glenn to do the slower feely ones.

# What did the Lowrys do in Cow?

John started playing drums in Cow. The first line up of Cow, was John Lowry on drums, Glenn on bass, David on guitar, me on acoustic guitar and John Bone on...

#### Violin.

And steel. 8 string lap steel. We played around in that line up for a while. Then the big band line up where we got in Mark on guitar and then Maureen and Suzi to sing (as the Sirloin Sisters). I don't know how it all got shifted around. Ah...that's right. Glenn gave up bass. And John went away. He (Glenn) went to drums and Mark went to bass. Then it fluctuated. I thought Maureen's analogy of a piano accordion was pretty good.

# So how did you meet Maureen?

 I went to college with her sister and I think we may have met before then through a mutual friend Steven Carson. I was tutoring at Kelvin Grove and she was a student.

# You met Glenn in Toowoomba. Was your first words to him really "That's shit mate"?

No I don't think so...(laughs) Most probably wouldn't have been much

better. I remember Glenn very clearly. I had a great respect for Glenn.
His attitude towards life. He was an outsider in his way of thinking at that time. And he was genuinely a nice, interesting guy. He got himself a Simonds drumkit, and I really liked that. So we hooked up as a rhythm section I suppose with various singer/songwriters.

# So you weren't writing songs at the time?

No, I've never been a songwriter. I mean I bang out a song now and then, but I never consider myself a songwriter. I enjoy playing and I enjoy being involved with bands.

# So this was the Tumbling Tumbleweeds?

Yeah. Glenn and I hooked up with a guy called John Skews. He was a great guitarist. He had a good take on things. Busking got a bit boring. but it was fun. We learnt how to play.

# Computor: that would have sprouted from Cow?

Aww...See I don't agree with the sprouting thing cause it sort of defines it. The name came from sitting around with Robert Forster when we were doing 'Calling from a Country Phone'. He didn't want to call the band Cow. We thought we could come up with another name. So we were sitting around and we came up with 'Robert Forster and Computor'. And Robert went "naaaah".

So then it was like "Ok let's make a tape. A tape of stuff. Let's get a cassette player and record". So we didn't start out with a vision. We started doing things on cassette players.

# What was the first song you worked on?

In the order that's on the tape. Yeah. We actually demoed a few songs. We went down to Brad Gilbert's place for a day and tried to do some stuff on his computer. But that was just boring, sitting around staring at this computer screen.

So we stole his 8 track and we came back to the practice room and enlisted Jeffery Erbacker. He's a sound guy. David and I started to record. So you can hear us through that tape us learning how to record the very first one, all the bass levels are really low. Because neither of us understood preamps. And we were plugging instruments straight into the back of the recorder. No line gain or anything like that. I remember Jeff walking in going "what the hell are you doing! You need to put a cassette player in that's got a preamp makes the needle go up in the red." Then that's when we started using the synthesisers. The SH101.

# What does the title "P.B. 3am Ann Street" mean?

Paul Barrot. That song was written to play in Paul's van. He was the guy who would do the run, we'd all pay, he'd lug gear. He was doing Cow shows and Custard shows. Then he started doing lights. It was a good system. That song was written for Paul driving around at 3 am after the gig.

# You went to the same high school as David, though you were a few years older. Had you met David at Ipswich Grammar?

# What is your relationship with David like these days?

Good. I mean we don't speak any-where near what we used to. And we're not doing anything together at the moment and I don't know if we ever will, but everything has its time. I really

enjoyed being involved in things that he was involved in and being part of that 52 Bradley Street. I have a great respect for Ian and Jude for allowing that to happen.

Maybe one day we'll get together and do something.

# Did you ever do anything with lan McCormack?

Yeah I've got a version of lan singing Kansas City which we recorded at the Sound Achievement sessions.

# What was your reaction to Custard calling the album Loverama? You told me you first heard it announced on the radio.

Yeah. My reaction? One of....ah...they could have come up with a better title than that. To me it was clutching at straws. Because I think the creativity of those guys together, they

don't need to borrow so much. I've got nothin' against it. No I think its a good title. I like the word. The only thing I got shitty about was because I'd just done a Mambo shirt called Loverama.

# What about Neil Finn? How did you become part of his latest touring band.

We'd been mates for a while, while the Crowdies were still going. So at the end of Crowded House Neil said I want you to get involved in the next



project. So I went over to New Zealand about 4 times and I got involved in the recording. Neil likes to have people around him to feed off and to be around his family. After that the record came out and Neil put together a touring band and I got the gig playing bass.

# You've just finished recording and mixing the new Cunningham CD. How did you approach it this time around?

Aw just the usual. When you've got no budget whatsoever. You just go out and try to get as much stuff as you can down and set up as a live band and see what you get. Be prepared to go "It didn't work".

Cunningham have shifted and changed along the way. So yeah it's finished.







# Arguably, your best work was the 30 sec ad fr Wahooti back in 1994, (so concise, incisive and interesting), how successful is the ad to you?

Thank you, it was not successful to me because I was not the product. I'm glad people saw it.

Your original script for the Pack yr Suitcases video went something like this: "The band climb some stairs opening a door at the top to reveal a brick

wall with clouds painted on it...cut to McCormack floating in a harness 3 feet from ground behind him is a large white sheet with grey clouds (symbolising heaven).

Suddenly the sheet drops to reveal an upmarket restaurant with well dressed, snotty people ignoring the rest of Custard as they join McCormack (who has landed) singing the cho-



# rus. The band pack up...etc." Why did the script change? Was it your idea to amend the backdrops to the lawn bowls club and the bowling alley?

After a long phone conversation with David it was decided that the party was too obvious, and a bowling club would

suffice. The idea is that lawn bowling = Heaven, (that's why they dress in white) Ten pin = earth (younger crowd)

# 'Life with the McCormacks' by ...

t was a beautiful Summer morning. Too nice of a morning, in fact, to be spent moving a house full of odd furniture into a cottage in Paddington. The job was made easier by the sense of elation and slight trepidation which always accompanies the move from one place to another. We were walking strong and forthright into an uncertain future. We were like pilgrims in a new land.

My house mates had been friends of mine for many years, David and Dylan McCormack. We had seen many aspects of each others' personalities over the years, however, living together was something only Dylan and I had done for a brief period. David was a completely different additive. The big question was, "Would he be natural colours and flavours?", or "MSG?"

The first thing we realised was that we owned too much furniture for such a small house. This combined with the fact that we were all musicians and owned a fair share of equipment between us ensured that there would never be a shortage of chairs to sit on and amplifiers to rest your dinner on. You could then feel free to choose from the selection of acoustic and electric guitars that peppered the house. Nic Naughton's drum kit always seemed to be about, but it usually spent most of it's time on the verandah.

It is only a matter of time when you move in to a new place before you find out exactly why things just seem to good to be true. Alas, we soon discovered our folley. On the first day of our tenure, a slightly comical greek man with a greatly comical moustache introduced himself to us as our landlord. Fine. He then proceeded to tell us that he lived next door. Not so fine. We all tried to hide the look of terror on our faces. There was no way that three guys living together with hundreds of watts of amplification weren't going to make a lot of noise at some point in the future.

Usually it's possible to plead ignorance to your landlord when he says he heard rumours of the police coming around at three in the morning. It's a lot harder to convince him when he's the one who actually made the call.

We gradually settled in and tried not to irritate the neighbours too much. Dylan and I continued our lives of idle recreation, which personally consisted of getting up around noon, reading, mucking around with the guitars and making dinner. David, naturally didn't spend a lot of time in Brisbane, but when he did, it was always a time for celebration. Matthew would often follow David back to Brisbane, even though at this point he resided in Sydney. This would often result in Matthew spending

the night in our loungeroom on a terrifying looking mattress which Dylan may have possibly been conceived on. After a Custard show during Christmas, I woke up with a particularly large bump on my head, apparently after having thrown up in the garden and passing out. I hope our landlord neighbour wasn't looking.

There was no particular family structure in the household, but if someone was going to be the mother figure, I would say it would be David. Dylan and I were more like the

unruly children. David was organised and concerned that things were operating smoothly (bills being paid etc.). He was also the first to turn the music up and party down to the wee hours. Perhaps he was like a bad parent who would drink too much vodka during the day and let the children play in traffic.

One source of conflict in the household concerned

Custard's Nintendo 64 - more precisely Goldeneye. That game could really bring out the competitive spirit in the McCormack boys', something I was unaccustomed to ,because I have always been a spindly armed non competitive type. To describe the effect this game had on me, however, I would like to use an analogy from a story I heard as a child. The story is about A Bull Called Francis:-.

Francis was a bull who liked nothing better than to sit under a tree all day and smell flowers. All of the other bulls spent all day practising their bullfighting, in the hope that one day they may be picked to fight in the local bull fighting arena. ( Where they would be inevitably skewered to death).

One day some matadors came to see the bulls fight, so as they may choose the wildest and bravest among them. They all tried their hardest to impress. Not Francis, He simply sat on the hill and continued smelling his flowers. Suddenly a bee flew out of one of the flowers and stung Francis on the nose. Of course Francis flew into a rage and jumped about as if he were crazy. The matadors were impressed and picked Francis to fight in a tournament the next day.

When Francis was led in to the arena, the crowd cheered and yelled. The senores threw their hats in the air and the beautiful Senoritas threw roses at Francis' feet. Instead of going crazy like everyone expected, he simply sat down and smelled the roses. (They don't tell you in the story if he ends up getting killed anyway.)

When I played against the McCormack boys in Goldeneye, I always began by ambling about in my simple, harmless way and enjoying the occasional pot shot with my rifle or bazooka. This would go on for a while until I was suddenly killed by a laser in one shot, or



blown away with a proximity mine. It was then that I would go in to a homicidal rage until my innocence had been stained by the blood of my enemies.

Or so I imagined. The truth is those boys were ruthless fighting machines and I was merely an enraged yet gentle bull with a beesting on its nose.

I have always found that when boys live

together they inevitably develop their own language. With us it was no different. Within days, we had perfected a language consisting of a complex series of impersonations, parodies and a curious two note whistle which could be used to signal either your arrival or departure. David was a master of abbreviating words and sentences and had already created his own kind of pigeon English, which I'm sure he had developed with the other members of Custard (especially Matthew) over the years. Dylan, I suspect, had watched a lot of television growing up, which manifested itself in his

habit of impersonating sports commentators and sporting identities. Dylan was always very fond of rapping and can be heard doing so on the Re-memoryman track. I myself was fond of the Sean Connery impersonation, in spite of a lack of ability to do an accurate Scottish Accent. This is an affliction of which I am greatly

ashamed, but practice makes perfect. One of my favourite noises was simian in origin and developed from seemingly nowhere. I imagine the noise to be what I would sound like laughing while freezing to death in sub zero temperatures. Anyway, we eventually went through a period where we decided to revert to English for a while, but we couldn't understand each other and soon reverted to old ways.



We had many adventures together over the brief time we were together (about six

months, I think.), one which resulted in David singing 'You Really Got Me' with the house band at The Sheraton on Christmas day, but the rest, through fear of incrimination, I can't mention here. David and Dylan eventually moved to Red Hill and I moved down the road to Petrie tee. I'm sure David will remember the time as being his last bachelor fling with 'da boys'. He married and moved to Sydney only a short time after moving out. Time marches on, however, and as with all share

house experiences, bad things are forgotten about, and good things perhaps greatly exaggerated. I'm sure we all now remember the house fondly and I



don't think my friends would disagree with me if I described it in the official dialect of the time as 'A Real Little Stinkhouse'.



David: Me and Paul were in a band together called "Who's Gerald?" it was hated by everybody. It was a Queensland Uni band we played at the rec. club stuff like that. There was triple zed involvement... then that broke up in a blaze of glory and I vowed I'd never be in a band with Paul again. Then we got in a band together with James, who's now in the Melniks who was originally in Custard, and a guy called Shane Bruun and then he went overseas, we got Danny and then Matthew joined to replace James and that's where we are now. We've been in this line up for about two years [in tone of wonder] and we're a stable line up

#### Semper: San Fransisco?

Paul: It's good. It's big.

David: It's scary now.

Paul: It's scary. We heard gun shots at night, things like that.

"Java Monoxide" is another name that I've got. You know how people drink coffee on the streets, like you know how it's a real popular thing to do these days. "Java", coffee "Monoxide", street. "Java Monoxide", "Suicide Car Bomber" is one that I heard on the news that I thought we could use, because people just wouldn't expect

The interview below was used for an article in the University of Queensland's Semper in 1995. Much of it didn't appear in the final version.

#### Semper. Then something would happen in America and you guys would be blamed

David: Sure, great. We're seriously thinking of starting up our own controversy, because you get a lot of mileage out of that. I'm going to send out faxes saving that someone killed themselves while listening to our record, and from there, that should be all I've got to do.

#### Semper: That'll probably cause more suicides to happen, though.

David: Good. I encourage people to kill themselves. No use shunning it is there. TISM had a song called "Kill yourself now and avoid the rush" which was a good thing. People just don't expect us to be...people expect us to be, I don't know. Like people give me these notes you know like little pencil sketches of teddy bears. I brought it along, just to show everyone the level to which these disgusting.

Paul: We got a Valentine card left on the car.

David: Yeah. We got one, but that's no good between four people. We got one Valentines card, as a group. That's it. It said "to Paul and the others". I mean seriously, I don't think we warrant that sort of stuff, Isis would warrant

that. I don't think, I think, once upon a time we were like that but I don't think we're anything like that now. There's other bands like Biro and stuff that are, you know, that whole cutesy thing, but I don't think we've got anything to do with that. I think of us as the Sunny Boys, I've discussed this with the rest of the band. You know the Sunny Boys who were like, early eighties, like they thought of themselves as very quirky and experimental, but in fact they were just boring and straight down the line. That's where I place, like Custard. And like Sunny Boys are you know, suburbia liked them

and the inner city didn't really like them, but greater suburbia didn't like them because they thought they were too weird. It's

like in a Venn diagram, that little tiny cross over, thing like us, these young boys, seventeen, at the moment it's got the Sunny Boys and Custard. Lalways think of us as sad. I don't think we play very happy songs at all in general.

#### Semper: The lyrics and the music might be telling different ideas.

David: Exactly, Musically and melodically it seems to be very much, maybe a sketch of a teddy bear, but I think all of our songs, like Pack

yr Suitcases, Fantastic Plastic, Alone, Apartment are very sad songs. Apartment is written about and continues to be about hearing loss. You know when you hear too much loud music you get that ringing in your ears. And no one ever cottoned onto that, I just thought it was the most obvious song I'd ever written.

#### Semper: In what way is it about hearing loss?

David: Your own head because you can't hear anything else, and the interiors red because, I imagine your head is red on the inside, and the "ears sing to me" bit is like because your ears are just going [David gives loud falsetto scream] and you've got no option, just deaf, that's it. And I don't think that's a very happy song.

#### Semper: But you sing it in such a happy way.

David: I don't think we do. We seem to be attracting a lot of 17 and 18 year olds, young guys come along in their stripy shirts and it's a vounger brother thing; very impressionable, very confused about sex, not really defined in their roles. They come along and see us. I don't mean it's anything sexual going on. You can just see that sex is put to the side...because we're the last thing they should be worried about. When I was that age I was petrified of sex, and they should be petrified about sex. And the songs,

> really, are about older people. I'm 27, Paul's 27, Matthew's 28. At my age sex is not a big deal. Food, television, sleeping are important. Sex is just an annoying thing. I mean it doesn't really profit, it doesn't really help anyone.

#### Semper: Continuation of the species is one thing...

David: Who does it for that purpose in our age group? Who comes here, has a few drinks and says, hang on, I'm thinking genetics, I've had a six pack and I really want to devote the rest of my life to a child. That's the last thing on their mind, and it shouldn't be. It should be the first thing on their mind. So they shouldn't waste their time on some-

eighteen, are too wrapped up in the music. If it was ten years ago they would have liked the Smiths, the Sunny Bays I think the Sunny Bays are a happy band in general and yet there's so many similarities with us, like "I'm alone with you tonight" that's a happy song. He's completely thrilled in that song, but that's where the similarity ends, musically and "Alone" that's where

the similarity end.

Semper. What's it like getting gigs all the time? David: It's good. We get to make a lot of money. It's not great financially, in pocket as such, but

there's lot of money going around all over the place

Paul: We're paying a lot of people to do things.

David: Where as we used to get one hundred and fifty bucks for playing somewhere and you'd see that now you play somewhere for X amount of dollars and you never see it. We see less money than we ever did and yet there's more figures, more zeros and stuff. I mean that's gotta be good for somebody. Someone is making a lot of money.

We've got a lot of people. We pay people for things that we don't have to do anymore, just little things: like plug something in.

Paul: [Laughs and nods].

David: You've gotta wonder, is it worth it?

Paul: [more laughs and nods]

Semper: What's your dream gig?

Paul: We did it last week

David: Yeah, we played at the playroom, that was our dream gig. It was very relaxed and it could go anywhere, it didn't have to rock. We could play quietly, play really really quietly. You know what I mean?

Paul;: Yeh I enjoyed that.

David: That Queensland Uni show really put me off

Semper: It seemed that everyone was going wild and there was people sitting on the stage and some really great moments, but then the moment it was over they started playing some Nirvana through the speakers and everyone just got up and went crazy to that anyway, like they'd forgotten you existed.

David: I think a lot of them just forgot we existed even while we were there. There were five percent who were there to see us, and knew who we were, an ninety five percent of them didn't have a clue about anything as long as it was like rock, like "Yeah, go off, what was your band called? I love you guys!" But that's alright. And Glenn from Cow got up and drummed two songs on Wednesday night, and when he came off stage he just said. "It doesn't matter what you do, it's got nothing to do with anything. As long as you get up there and hit something". He was just amazed by it. The lack of attention anyone was paying to the music, which sometimes is really good. But I just got sick of it that night. Did you?

Paul: I did too, yeah. There's people at the show that know Apartment so they come along to the shows but that's all.

David: I'd like a narrative all the way through like you know those little books that have the story and it goes "BING: turn the page". I'd like to do something like that, so you'd have a song: "I am the insect.. dee dee dee dee da dee". Like a little song then you go bing. There'd be a story, I'm just making it up. It'd have a lot more meat to it than that, but it'd be a nice moral tale. I don't know if we've got the guts to really make a concept album. I'd like to but I just don't think anything would come out of it.

#### Semper. Who's going to produce your next record?

to make on our last record, where we went to America and everything was a dream. Recording wise there's no goals left for us to do except, you know, do it again. Say you wanted to play a computer game and someone let you fly to America to play this definitive version and you go and you solve it and then it's like ..? Then you've done it, you know how it ends. So we're going to have to get someone...someone, who, I don't know, maybe someone who knows nothing about music, like a carpenter, and they could just construct it from a different point of view. Or maybe we can... I've got this other fantasy of mine which involves no one in the band being in the studio at the same time, so Paul goes in and puts the bass line down.

Paul: Fleetwood Mac did something similar.

David: Is that what they did!? You know...get Paul to play a bass line from a click track and Danny comes in and then I sing and then Matthew puts his guitar over the top of it, so we never discuss it with each other, so everyone does what they want to do without influence from other people. I think it'd be great. The last record cost us more zeros than you can poke a stick at, so this one we're going to do for less than we made Wahooti Fandango for. We've spent all the money we can, let's try to spend the least money we can, and see where that goes. When I say we spent a lot of money, we didn't see any of that, the record company pays for it all and then bills us, so we're at a point where we owe them \$170,000. So we've got to sell about 170,000 records to ever pay them

Semper: Do you enjoy this recognition and popu-

David: Yeah I love it. As long as no one comes around to my house and bugs me, but no one does. But that would bug me, you'd just be watching bay watch or something, waiting for something good to come on... Danny can we get your opinion here?

Danny: I have no comment on that opinion. Semper: Apathy? Is that your opinion?

Danny: I believe in rock'n'roll, that's all I've got

Semper: That's it! How's your kit going? Danny: My kit's going err...

Semper. Is it in good shape after the other

Danny: I can't believe these guys. What are they? what's their fucking game? You'd think they were on dr...

Semper: What are they on?

Danny: What are they on? Exactly, If you could find out for me I'd gladly appreciate it, it could make a lot of money.

#### Semper: Religion?

We spent more money than we could ever hope David: I've been to church twice. Once as a godfather for Paul's baby. Paul's got a young child called Madison and he asked me to be the godfather...(interrupted by technical dork...) See! That's why we pay other people, so we don't have to know anything about nothing. Here's the song list for tonight, what do you think of it? That's the encore there if we get asked for one. Violins and Lucky Star.

> Semper [to Matt]: We ran into you and Danny at Big Day Out, at gold coast big day out you were on your way to see pomo for pyros and we saw you two and we ran into...

Matt: That was a long time ago, I apologise for my memory

Semper, you were going to go chat up Kylie Minoque, I think was the next plan, I don't think you got around to that.

Matt: That was plan C.

Semper: Danny was dragging you back at bit. Matt: Yeah.



#### Semper: What's your opinion on the the Australian music scene at the moment?

Matt: From our point of view it's great at the moment. There's always great bands at the moment, it's just that hardly any of them ever get a chance, that's all, there's bands like Drop City now and Snout, they're like fantastic bands and they're all getting gigs now. Ammonia's just got back from America and did famously over there. Everything's looking up.

Semper. Do you guys have any plans for going overseas.

Matt. America in September. That's what's written down on the little sheet of paper, but I don't know if it'll happen, but it definitely will this year. The old guard of the Australian booking companies, are dying and going, slowly but surely. Barnesy's too old, who needs him?

# HOW TO WRITE A CUSTAL SONG

ne day you wake up and say to yourself: "Christ! I wish I could write a Custard song all of my own!" Well now is your chance. Read on...

A title. Usually a title comes last, but for no particular reason I am starting here. Basically you have two options.

The 'generic' title, i.e. Alone or Apartment or you can try a gag title of some sort. If you choose the latter you can go

with a ridiculously long title like The Synthesiser is rapidly overtaking the guitar as the most popular instrument in the world or Eight years of Rock 'n' roll has completely destroyed my memory. A title like "I just went to the shops and bought a litre of milk for \$1.23" is probably not what you are looking for.

Conversely there is the abruptly short titles of songs like Edie, CBDB and Bad. (A tip here is to name the song after the song's chords. Very cheeky, but the gag wears thin after about 3 songs)

Length. OKyou've got your title...now you should decide how long to make the song. The shortest song in the Custard catalogue is Cut Lunch at approx 0:47:59. Blink and you'll miss it. While I live by the River from Buttercup/Bedford is 6:22, practically a 70s prog-rockepic. According to Bill's Colossal Guide to the Music of Custard (Dogsbreath Press: 1999) the average length of a Custard song is 2 minutes and 41 seconds. So aim for

that mark, give or take a second or two.

Words. The next ingredient is words. (You may prefer to write the music first; either way is acceptable.) There are a few words that you'll find get a decent workout in the Custard

anthology. Consult the box on the right for more information.

Generally you can't go wrong with words like "dream", "heart", "road", "radio" or my all time favourite "sun". (See table at right for more details).

Next include a reference to

some locality. Refer to songs like Teensville, Nice Bird, Pinball Lez and Caboolture Speed Lab. For research you may wish to consult TV shows like (in QLD) the Great South East or maybe Brisbane Extra if you wish to get seriously high-brow.

If you are having trouble with the words ask Cusdad for

help.

David often bases songs around inspiration from a conversation with a friend or a bandmate. Maureen Hansen actually said the first line in Pinball Lez. Something Nick Naughton told David appeared in Pluto and then there was Trevor Ludlow's phrase 'Girls like that don't go for guys like us' which appeared in a Custard song who's name presently escapes me.

Another trick is to stick a weird

word or phrase in somewhere. A word that is utterly incongruous and as awkward sounding as possible like "fjords" (from Melody) or maybe "compass watch" from Gazebo and Nude or even "phillips head screw" from Almost Like a Song.

Occasionally you may wish to include some profanity for effect. Custard has steadily introduced these words into their songs over the years starting in 1994 with "shit" in If yr famous... climaxing with "fuck" in Ringo late last year. Live it is open slather.

Religious references were once popular: there's angels in *Dreamer* and in *The Golden Age of Nicotine*. 'Heaven' or 'God' is mentioned in the first three songs on Wahooti.

Another increasingly typical feature of Custard songs is a dig at the music industry or the record company. Loverama is littered with them. Almost like a Song, Hit Song, and Ringo.

The last, but most vital ingredient in any decent Custard lyric is personal pronouns. Go crazy here. The more the merrier.

Music. If Dylan, Matt or Paul hasn't inspired you with some chords or a riff you'll just have to make do with whatever you can think up. Sprinkle your chords with minors here and there and always add a tricky bridge. It's always useful to spice the arrangement with a country feel. Don't worry if the song sounds weak and

wussy initially. As soon as Matt hears it he will beef it up with some power chords and a generous helping of distortion.

# HISTORY OF CUSTARD 1999 SUPPLEMENT

We pick up the story in the heady days of May 1999. Robert Bogucki was about to find himself by losing himself, John Laws had just decided that the banks were alright after all and the world was still to be blessed with the Whitlams' "Chunky Chunky Air Guitar". So it was that on May 20 (Paul's 31st) JJJ ran a 3 hour Custard J-file with Richard Kingsmill.

In the next few weeks, JJJ ran a "Shonkey Songs" competition. Custard recorded covers like Madonna's Like a Virgin and Dire Strait's Romeo and Juliet and listeners were invited to enter by naming all ten songs and the winner was awarded Custard playing at their house along with JJJ broadcasting the event live. In August Custard ventured to Caboolture's outskirts to play for the lucky winner.

On June 14 Loverama was released after a long delay. The CD was plaqued by

problems. Some CDs were missing David's "We wanna party". The CDR component was buggy and resembled Blur's CDR in 13 and my version wouldn't work on a Macintosh, Some people have reported to me that their CD simply didn't work at all and were forced to exchange it at the store. As Troy explained in this issue of Cuszine, "...to set up an album release as important

as Loverama requires at least 6 months careful, and draining, planning and work. Some mistakes will always slip through the net." The CDR was virgin territory for a band like Custard and I am sure most people forgave the band and BMG for these minor problems.

To coincide with the album Paul designed a webpage that delved deeper than even I would into the mysteries behind the CD.

Also in June Custard appeared on Hey Hey for the third time playing Hit Song and just before the credits, avec lab coats they played Ricky Martin's Livin La vida Loca. David had bleached his hair for the occasion.

# Ringo

What does it feel like to 'feel like Ringo'? Perhaps Ringo is one of those Custard songs darker and deeper than it pretends Ringo introduced us to W-bins: "No W-Bins! No W-Bins!" David cried. I thought he was saving "Don't dirty your pants! Don't dirty your pants!", but that is another story.

In August the (I feel like ... ) Ringo single eventuated dedicated to Anouk, Emma. Jane and Tracey. The truncated and remixed single version of the song (sans the 'Uncle Davey' monologue and sans the word "fucked".) did not do as well as one would've hoped. Alas, Ringo may have ended up (undeservedly) in the trash bin of history.

> The video was fantastic. It starred Maria Venuti and 5 very glam looking Custaros. B-sides on Ringo were the original version of Caboolture Speed Lab, an earlier Umlaut from the Greg Wale sessions and Glenn's Lost and Found.

> Custard and Andrew Lancaster won their first Aria in September for best video. (Grrls like that). David described the occa-

sion as "mainly a load of rubbish...I left early to let the Australian rock world indulge in cocaine and talk about themselves."

Around August Custard toured extensively with DJ Dr Love (an ex member of the Clash) in support with Andrew and Paul Thomas joining the band.

# The New Matthew

In November Custard performed for Good News Nite Lite. It was their 2nd appearance that year. David and Emma were

panelists in the game show part. Earlier the New Matthew was pressed. It had a good looking cover and some great bsides, (apart from the 4th version of Caboolture Speed Lab. Was it just me or was 4 versions of this song becoming a little tedious?)

# Other events and the future?

In September and October Custard became part of the Art tour with Regurgitator and the Resin Dogs.

In November Sarah Longhurst decided to quit as manager of Custard, Pollyanna and Big Heavy Stuff. To me Sarah always seemed tired and overworked in her managerial role. I guess she got sick of it.

The plans for the future include a six month break from touring. It was thought that they had over saturated the market and it was time to lay off for a while. Both Matt and Paul now have steady jobs. Matt works in a bottle shop and Paul is working for a web design company. David gets a lot of work through Andrew's company Supersonic. Sometimes he writes iingles for advertisements. Glenn is playing in a few bands in Sydney and will get married sometime soon. Andrew is very busy with Supersonic and Lino and it is likely that Custard will revert to a 4-piece when they start touring again.

It is doubtful that a David McCormack solo album will come about in the near future. He and Emma now live in a house in Marrickville (near Glenn) with their cat Mullet and their dog Muriel.

Matthew is currently recording some songs with Boatshow. Also in Boatshow: Martin Lee (ex-Regurgitator), Phil from Grinspoon, a friend of Matt's called John and the bassplayer from Violetine.

Custard filmed the video for The New Matthew on the 3rd of December.

A new album may be recorded in February 2000.

HugBubble released
